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Different Psychology Programs: What is your career goal? How long are you willing to be in school for? Generally, there are three models of training: Research, clinical, and research-clinical (AKA scientistpractitioner).

Research (Masters, Doctorate): CEGEP Professor (MA), Researcher (MA/PhD), University Professor (PhD).

Clinical (Masters, Doctorate): Psychologist (PsyD), Counsellor (MA), Art therapist (MA)

Research-Clinical: Psychologist (PhD), Researcher (PhD), Professor (PhD)

Psychology Specialties (see links with EXAMPLE programs)

<u>Clinical psychology</u>: Clinical psychologists assess and treat severe mental disorders (e.g., Depression, bipolar). <u>Counselling psychology</u>: Counselling psychologists treat shorter-term mental health difficulties that arise due to environmental issues (e.g., divorce, trauma).

School psychology: School psychologists support students' ability to learn and teachers' ability to teach with expertise in learning, behaviour, mental health, and school systems.

<u>Neuropsychology</u>: Neuropsychologists evaluate and treat people with various types of nervous system disorders (i.e., Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, concussions, Traumatic Brain Injury).

Art Therapy: Art therapists use the process of self-expression and the resulting artwork to help clients understand their mental health difficulties and restore mental functioning.

Music Therapy: Music therapists use music to address clients' cognitive, communicative, emotional, musical, physical, social, and spiritual needs.

Drama Therapy: Drama therapists use theatre techniques like role-playing and storytelling to help clients work through mental health difficulties (e.g., behavioral problems, process trauma).

<u>Play Therapy</u>: Play therapists help children overcome emotional/behavioural difficulties through play.


What is a PsyD/Psychology Doctorate?

- Professional degree recognized by the OPQ (Ordre des psychologues du Québec) which leads to becoming a licensed Psychologist (and/or neuropsychologist)
- 60 % Clinical vs 40% Research (project is shorter, about the length of a MA thesis)
- 4 year programs versus 7 year programs
- See example from the <u>Université de Sherbrooke –</u> <u>Campus Longueil</u>

Classes:

- Differ by concentration; lots of variety, very clinical based (use of "real world" examples)
- Practicums at the university clinic (variety of consultants) AND at external setting with supervision (e.g., private practice, CLSC, CIUSS, School).

NOTE: The OPQ-recognized programs in Quebec are offered at francophone universities!
